Yesterday marked the eleventh anniversary of the tragic events of 9/11. It also marked a day when the U.S. Embassy in Cairo and the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi were attacked. The attack in Benghazi resulted in the loss of life, including the life of the U.S. Ambassador John C. Stevens. The U.S. Consulate in Curacao would like to take this opportunity to remind all U.S. citizens that they should carefully consider the information and suggestions presented in the World Wide Caution of July 18, 2012.
