



Emergency Message for U.S. Citizens: Buenos Aires (Argentina), Scheduled Protest Buenos Aires

A protest march about domestic issues is being coordinated by unions not aligned with the Argentine government. It is anticipated to take place in Buenos Aires on December 19, 2012, beginning at 4:00 p.m. According to the media, the march will start in the area around the Obelisk and advance toward the Plaza de Mayo along Diagonal Norte and Diagonal Sur, and also along Avenida de Mayo. These protests will significantly disrupt the flow of traffic in the Microcentro area. While this activity is focused in Buenos Aires, similar demonstrations may take place in other cities in the country. At this time, the participating unions are not planning any work stoppages. Please continue to monitor local media and be prepared to alter your work and travel schedules over the next week.

Even demonstrations intended to be peaceful can turn confrontational and escalate into violence. You should avoid areas of demonstrations, and exercise caution if in the vicinity of any large gatherings, protests, or demonstrations. Review your personal security plans; remain aware of your surroundings, including local events; and monitor local news stations for updates. Maintain a high level of vigilance and take appropriate steps to enhance your personal security and follow instructions of local authorities.

We strongly recommend that U.S. citizens traveling to or residing in Argentina enroll in the Department of State's Smart Traveler Enrollment Program (STEP). STEP enrollment gives you the latest security updates, and makes it easier for the U.S. embassy or nearest U.S. consulate to contact you in an emergency. If you don't have Internet access, enroll directly

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with the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate.
