



Security Message for U.S. Citizens: Pristina (Kosovo), Planned Demonstration on November 14

The U.S. Embassy Pristina informs U.S. citizens that demonstrations are expected to take place near Zahir Pajaziti Square in Pristina on November 14, 2016, beginning at 12:00. A political party, along with members of civil society will be recognizing the death of a party member in prison. The anticipated size of the protest is unknown.

Even demonstrations intended to be peaceful can become confrontational and escalate into violence. You should avoid areas of demonstrations, and exercise caution if in the vicinity of any large gatherings, protests, or demonstrations.
